

Considering IGNITE: What to Discuss with Your Doctor

The IGNITE clinical research study is seeking adults who have primary central nervous system lymphoma (PCNSL) to participate in research that will evaluate an investigational study drug's safety and ability to help stop disease progression.

If you are thinking about participation in IGNITE, we encourage you to print a copy of this document from IGNITEClinicalTrial.com, save it to your mobile phone, or write down notes to bring to your next doctor visit.

The decision to participate in a clinical research study takes a lot of time and careful thought. It may be a good option for some people but not others, depending on one's condition and circumstances.

This guide is designed to help you have a conversation with your healthcare provider about participating in the IGNITE clinical research study.

Starting the Conversation

Start by letting the doctor know that you might be interested in the study and explain why. When talking to a doctor about clinical research, it will be helpful to provide them with some details about the specific study. You can show them the following information, which will help them find this study in their online database:

- **Study name** – IGNITE (protocol number ONO-4059-17)
- **Purpose** – To evaluate if an investigational drug (tirabrutinib) is safe and works to stop disease progression, compared with a standard PCNSL treatment, in adults who have primary central nervous system lymphoma (PCNSL) that has returned after responding to treatment (relapsed) or has either not improved with prior treatment or come back rapidly after initially responding (refractory). Tirabrutinib will be compared with rituximab and temozolomide (R-TMZ) combination therapy.
- **Study design** – A phase 3 trial comparing tirabrutinib monotherapy to R-TMZ (rituximab and temozolomide combination therapy) in about 130 participants through 28-day cycles.

General Questions

Considering all options with a healthcare provider will help you make the best decision. You can ask some general questions, such as:

- **Why do people join clinical research studies?**
- **Does joining a study make sense for me?**
- **What are the benefits and risks?**
- **What are my other options if I don't participate in this study?**

Specific Study Questions

It is important to look at every aspect of study participation when making a decision. Here are some specific questions you may want to ask your doctor about IGNITE:

- **Is this study a good fit for me?**
- **How would joining this study affect my current treatment plan?**
- **Will my current healthcare providers still be involved in my care?**
- **What would I need to do during this study?**
- **Are there any costs associated with joining this study?**

If your doctor thinks IGNITE might be a good fit, they can help you decide what your next steps should be. This may involve taking the online prescreening questionnaire, or you or your doctor contacting the nearest study site directly.
